1. Call to Order

a. Meeting was called to order at 1:40 PM

2. Introduction of guest

- a. Chair Collopy introduced (guests in attendance-listed by name)
- 3. Public Comments N/A
- 4. Guest Speaker: Rick Majchrzak, Deputy District Attorney
 - a. Presented an overview of the District Attorney's Office approach to managing juvenile justice.
- 5. County Counsel Report N/A
- 6. Probation Report
 - a. The next JJCC Subcommittee is scheduled for July 19, 2021.
 - b. The July 12, 2021, Pathway to Success (PTS) Supervision Meeting has been postponed.
 - c. The Probation Department received \$360 thousand dollars from a grant. They will be using some of the money on Trauma Informed Care training for PTS staff.
 - d. Monday, July 5, 2021, PTS became live. They currently have two boys and one girl in the program.
 - e. 133 youth in custody between all three facilities
 - i. 74 in Juvenile Halls
 - ii. 56 in AMC-YTEC
 - iii. 3 in PTS
 - f. SB 81 Round Two \$17.5M awarded. The Probation Department is working with an architectural firm to expand YTEC (not beds) vocational, educational, and recreational areas.
 - g. BSCC bi-annual inspection will be after October.
 - h. The new Probation transportation team will be run by DPOs.



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- The Probation Department was awarded \$93 thousand dollars from the National School Lunch Program. They will be buying equipment for all three facilities with the monies.
- Probation is looking into Proud Parent Grant which will help with youth who have children.
- k. No new Covid cases.
- I. 19% decrease on safety incidents last month.

7. DPSS Report

- a. A DPSS Report handout was provided.
- b. DPSS provided more information on Short-Term Residential Therapeutic Program (STRTP).
 - i. A new federal ruling will affect any STRTP facility that is over 16 beds. This includes companies that have multiple locations. If they have a combined 16 or more beds they will also have to be assessed.
 - ii. To date, no one has been assessed.
 - iii. Next month they should have more information on assessment details.
 - iv. DPSS ran a report and they 50 youth who are located within the facilities that need to be assessed.
 - v. STRTP is a nationwide change.
 - vi. Resource Family Approval (RFA) will not be affected by the new federal changes.
 - vii. The new changes are regarding federal monies that go toward the STRTP facilities. A discussion on foster care pricing and rates.
 - viii. 10 out of state youth were brought back to California. Most of the youth are adjusting. A discussion about one youth who is not adjusting well and contracting with ETS.
 - ix. DPSS is working on Continuous Quality Improvement (CQI) is a deliberate, defined process which focused on continuous improvement.
 - x. Discussed after age foster youth and transitional housing options.





Who do we serve?

Individuals (12 years old to 25 years old depending on charge or when brought before the Court) who are charged with a misdemeanor and/or felony

AND

Youth (Non-Minor Dependents) who qualify for extended foster care benefits from 18 years old to 21 years old (Covid extensions until September 30, 2021)

What We Do:

Rule of Court 5.663

- (b) <u>Responsibilities of Counsel</u>: A child's counsel is charged in general with <u>defending the child against the allegations</u> in all petitions filed in delinquency proceedings and <u>with advocating</u>, within the framework of the delinquency proceedings, that the <u>child receive care</u>, treatment, and guidance consistent with his or her best interest.
- (c) <u>Right to representation</u> A child is entitled to have the <u>child's interests</u> represented by counsel at every stage of the proceedings, including postdispositional hearings. Counsel must continue to represent the child unless relieved by the court on the substitution of other counsel or for cause.



What training we are required to complete:

- 12 hours of training in the area of juvenile delinquency prior to appointment (8 hours each subsequent year)
- (2) Attorney training must include:
- (A) An overview of delinquency law and related statutes and cases;
- (B) Trial skills, including drafting and filing pretrial motions, introducing evidence at trial, preserving the record for appeal, filing writs, notices of appeal, and posttrial motions;
- (C) Advocacy at the detention phase;
- (D) Advocacy at the dispositional phase;
- (E) Child and adolescent development, including training on interviewing and working with adolescent clients;
- (F) Competence and mental health issues, including capacity to commit a crime and the effects of trauma, child abuse, and family violence, as well as crossover issues presented by youth involved in the dependency system;
- (G) Police interrogation methods, suggestibility of juveniles, and false confessions;
- (H) Counsel's ethical duties, including racial, ethnic, and cultural understanding and addressing bias;
- (I) Cultural competency and sensitivity relating to, and best practices for, providing adequate care to LGBTQIA youth;
- (J) Understanding of the effects of and how to work with victims of human trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation of children and youth;
- (K) Immigration consequences and the requirements of Special Immigrant Juvenile Status;
- (L) General and special education, including information on school discipline;
- (M) Extended foster care;
- (N) Substance abuse;
- (O) How to secure effective rehabilitative resources, including information on available community-based resources;
- (P) Direct and collateral consequences of court involvement;
- (Q) Transfer of jurisdiction to criminal court hearings and advocacy in adult court;
- (R) Appellate advocacy; and
- (S) Advocacy in the post-dispositional phase


- 1. Prevent youth from full entry into the juvenile justice system by establishing and utilizing a coordination of community resources early in the juvenile court process.
