1. Call to Order

- a. With a quorum present, the meeting was called to order at 1:30 p.m.

2. Roll Call

- a. Chair Christopher Collopy

3. Closed Session

- a. Per the request of Commissioner Cook, the Commissioners adjourned the regular meeting and entered a closed session for the purpose of addressing a single issue. All non-Commissioners, and meeting participants were excused.
- b. **ADJOURN TO CLOSED SESSION** - Commissioners adjourned to Closed Session meeting at approximately 1:31 p.m. There is no reportable action from the closed session.

9. Probation Report: Dave Searing, Probation Division Director (DD)

- a. Provided population count update.

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DD Searing noted the total number of fights was 18; the fights were due to gang involvement, and the inability for them to get along with each other.

- c. A nationally recognized motivational speaker from Mindset of Champions will be speaking at Southwest Juvenile Hall (SWJH) on June 28, 2022, and on June 29, in Indio Juvenile Hall.
- d. Probation Staffing/Recruitment – Probation is now working with a recruitment agency in hopes of filling vacant positions.
- e. There was one suicide ideation at SWJH, and a bomb threat was made towards the Youth Treatment and Education Center (YTEC) graduation ceremony. Riverside Police Department (RPD) responded and cleared the facility. DD Searing reported there have been no further reports of fentanyl getting into any of the institutions.
- f. Further discussion ensued concerning off-the-ground activities for YTEC youth and the staffing challenges that have hindered/delayed the process. It was noted that off-the-ground activities are still a goal of YTEC, and outside agencies have been recruited to bring some outside activities into the institution.
- g. Commissioner's request:
 - iv. Motivational speaker materials to be shared with the Commission.
 - v. DD Searing assured the group the materials would be made available to them.
 - vi. Data on Recidivism Rates (past 2 years).
 - vii. DD Searing noted data on recidivism rates is available for YTEC, and due to the newness of Pathways to Success (PTS), no data is available thus far.

10. DPSS Report: Jennifer Kopfler, Deputy Director, Department of Public Social Services

- a. Overview of handout on: Referral stats, Placements, Referral Trend Comparison, CSEC Referrals and Cases and Response Priority rates.
- b. Staffing shortages continue to pose a significant challenge; retention and recruitment remain a priority.
- c. Hotline Overview/New changes: To expedite and reduce wait times, they have added a law enforcement-only line. It was noted that approximately 60% of the calls resulted in referrals and 30% of the calls were informational only. There are 50 intake specialists handling calls.
- d. Preventive Service Grant: As part of the state's Emergency Response Grant, DPSS is in the process of adding a Preventive Services Unit consisting of intake specialists and social workers.
- e. Overview of: The California Structured Decision Making (SDM) model. The purpose of the SDM Hotline Tool is to support and guide social workers in assessing whether a referral meets the statutory threshold for an in-person child welfare services response. If it is determined that in-person response is required, the Hotline Tool will assist the social worker in determining the response priority and timeframe (or how quickly to respond).



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f. Commissioner's request:

- i. Track and assess what cities calls are coming from and focus on those cities with the most needs. DPSS can/will add the data to the stat report (break it down per region by allegation). It was noted that the data would be beneficial in the JJDPCs bullying initiative.
- ii. Request data for youth who choose to emancipate instead of going the non-minor dependent route.
- iii. Commissioners would like to shadow the Hotline call center.
- iv. Request for group home names for JJDPC inspection.

11. Guest Speaker: Jay Franklin, Project One

- a. Gang intervention specialist Jay Franklin provided an in-depth presentation on Project One. The Community-Based Gang Intervention Model places gang intervention specialists within communities to promote public safety with the specific objective of reducing and stopping gang violence. The team is composed of a multidisciplinary group of professionals from the fields of law enforcement, probation, outreach, education, and social services, who work together with youth in Riverside. Additionally, Jay noted he is the Campus Safety Manager for Riverside County Office of Education (RCOE).
- b. There was a brief discussion following the presentation.

12. New Business

- a. 2019-20 Annual Report: Status
 - i. It was decided that FY 2019-2020 and FY 2021-2022 annual reports will be combined.
- b. Lockup/Group Home Inspections Schedule
 - i. It was decided that the three (3) most problematic group homes, identified by DPSS, will be the first to be inspected.

Item 12c will be addressed succeeding items (12e and 12f).

12e. Commissioner Paul Parker – Welcome

- i. The group welcomed and congratulated Paul Parker as the newest JJDPC Commissioner.

12f. Meeting with RCOE re: Anti-Bullying efforts

- i. Commissioners Collopy and Malsed will be meeting with Riverside County Office of Education (RCOE) on June 20, 2022. They will update the Commission on efforts to collaborate with ROCE at the next meeting.

c. Nominations for Officers

- i. The meeting proceeded to the election of Officers. All present having voted, the following were elected or reelected as Officers:

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13. Correspondence Discussion Items:

- a. Continuum of Care Reform – Humboldt JJDPC
 - i. Humboldt JJDPC is looking to build a consensus among the JJDPCs on The Continuum of Care Reform (CCR). JJDPC is waiting to hear back from them on the next steps.
- b. KIC (Kids in Conflict) Foundation quarterly records of disbursement: noting date, amount of disbursement, and purpose (until funds are exhausted).
 - i. No disbursements in this last period.

14. Activities of the Commissioners:

- a. Inspections: Chair: Vacant, Vice Chair: Commissioner Curtis
 - i. The Commission needs to select three group homes and three lock-ups for inspection.
 - ii. Commissioner Curtis will champion the inspection process.
- b. Awards: Chair: Commissioner Collopy
 - i. The 2023 awards planning will resume later this year.
- c. Anti-Bullying: Chair: Commissioner Malsed, Vice Chair: Commissioner Collopy
 - i. Commissioners Collopy and Malsed will meet with Riverside County Office of Education. More details are to come at next month's meeting.
- d. By-Laws/Policies/Procedures: Chair: Commissioner Cook, Vice Chair: Commissioner Lippert
 - i. Commissioner Cook will meet with the new JJDPC secretary (Cynthia Magill) to make proposed changes.
- e. Ad-hoc Legislative Committee: Vacant
 - i. Commissioner Bowen, agreed to chair the Ad-hoc Legislative Committee.
- f. Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council (JJCC) Activity: Subcommittee to Draft County-wide Services Survey – Chair: Chris Collopy
 - i. Commissioner Collopy is lobbying for an outside/independent agency to complete the survey task vs. the JJCC CBOs, and volunteers.
 - ii. Further discussed was the “shockingly low” number of youths served by the CBOs.
 - iii. Commissioner Bowen has information from a local community foundation that has done statistics and mapping on where the hardest hit communities are, and where the most services are concentrated on in Riverside County. She will forward the foundation's information to Commissioner Collopy.

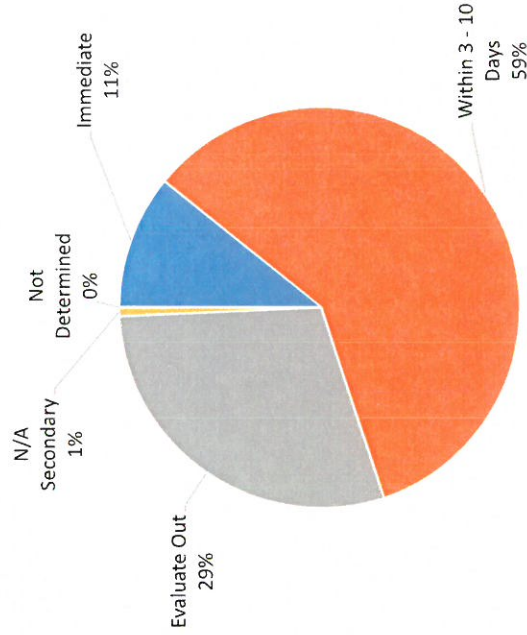

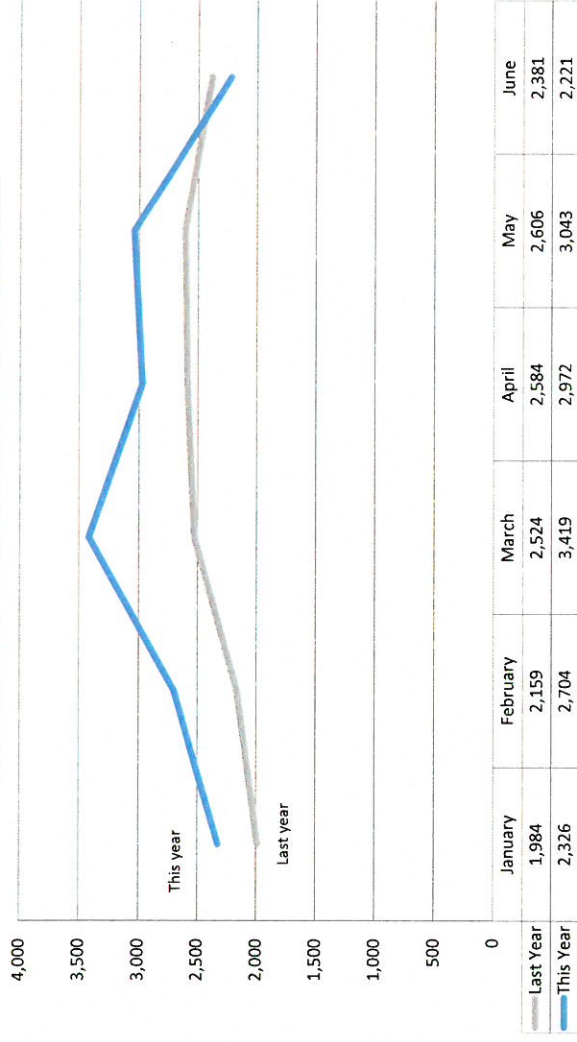

6 Months Referrals Trend Comparison

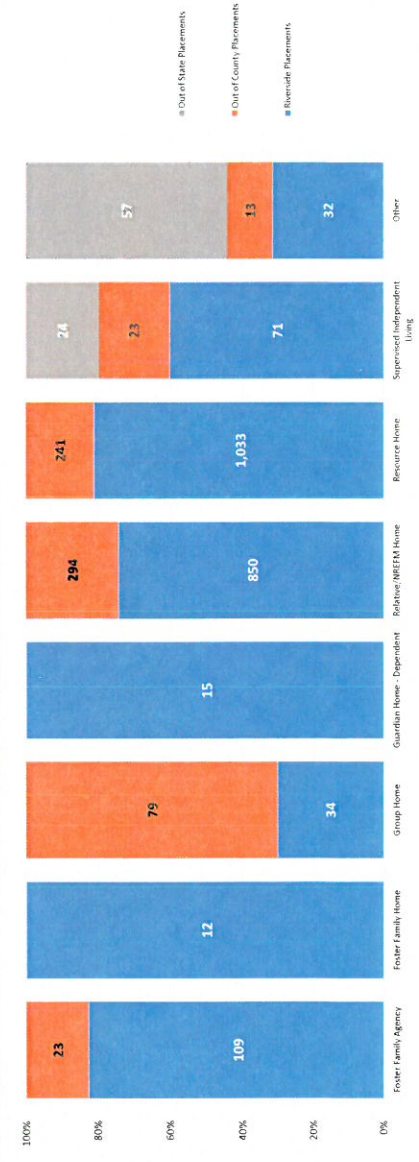

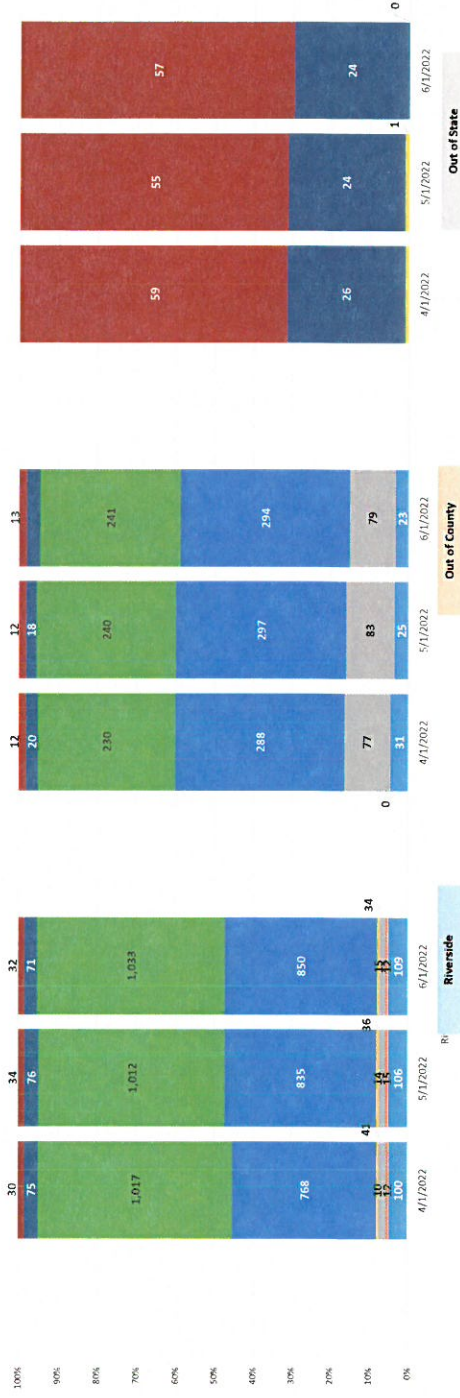
