Problem Statement

Due to the passing of SB 823, the Riverside County Probation Department will need to enhance our secured treatment facility by July 2021.







Main Elements of SB823 & Subcommittee Coordination

Main Elements of SB 823

- Intake at DJJ stops 7/1/21
- New state Office of Youth and Community Restoration
- JJCC subcommittee to be created in each county
- Local Plans not submitted to OYCR until 2nd year-FY 22/23
- Funding at full implementation: \$208.8 million
- New disposition track to be created by March 2021
- DOJ plan to replace JCPSS

Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council Subcommittee

(WIC 1995)

- Every county to create a subcommittee within JJCC as requirement to receive funding via block grant
- Probation Chief to Chair
- Members include representatives from:
 - · district attorney's office,
 - · public defender's office,
 - · department of social services,
 - · department of mental health,
 - county office of education or a school district.
 - the court.

- no fewer than three additional community members defined as individuals who have experience providing community-based youth services, youth justice advocates with expertise and knowledge of the juvenile justice system, or have been directly involved in the juvenile justice system.
- Does not specify who identifies community members on subcommittee.





SB823 Critical Requirements

- Grant funds will be applied to address each of the following areas of need or development for realigned youth:
 - ✓ Mental health, sex offender treatment, or related behavioral or trauma-based needs.
 - ✓ Support programs or services that promote healthy adolescent development.
 - ✓ Family engagement in programs.
 - ✓ Reentry, including planning and linkage to employment, housing, and continuing education.
 - ✓ Whether and how the plan will include services or programs for realigned youth that are provided by nongovernmental or community-based providers.
- A description of how data will be collected on the youth served and outcomes for youth served by the block grant program, including a description the outcome measures that will be utilized to measure or determine the results of programs and interventions supported by block grant funds.
