## A RESOLUTION OF THE JUVENILE JUSTICE COORDINATING COUNCIL **SUBCOMMITTEE AUTHORIZING REMOTE TELECONFERENCE MEETINGS** OF THE LEGISLATIVE BODIES OF JUVENILE JUSTICE COORDINATING COUNCIL **SUBCOMMITTEE** FOR THE PERIOD SEPTEMBER 13, 2022 - OCTOBER 12, 2022 PURSUANT TO THE RALPH M. BROWN ACT.

WHEREAS, all meetings of Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council Subcommittee and its legislative bodies are open and public, as required by the Ralph M. Brown Act (Cal. Gov. Code §§ 54950 - 54963), so that any member of the public may attend, participate, and view the legislative bodies conduct their business; and

WHEREAS, the Brown Act, Government Code section 54953(e), makes provisions for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body, without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain conditions and requirements; and

WHEREAS, a required condition of Government Code section 54953(e) is that a state of emergency is declared by the Governor pursuant to Government Code section 8625, proclaiming the existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the state caused by conditions as described in Government Code section 8558(b); and

WHEREAS, a further required condition of Government Code section 54953(e) is that state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, or, the legislative body holds a meeting to determine or has determined by a majority vote that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health and safety of attendees; and

26 WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, Governor Newsom issued a Proclamation of a State of Emergency declaring a state of emergency exists in California due to the threat of COVID-19, pursuant to the California 28 Emergency Services Act (Government Code section 8625); and,

WHEREAS, on June 11, 2021, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-07-21, which formally rescinded the Stay-at-Home Order (Executive Order N-33-20), as well as the framework for a gradual, risk-based reopening of the economy (Executive Order N-60-20, issued on May 4, 2020) but did not rescind the proclaimed state of emergency; and,

WHEREAS, on June 11, 2021, Governor Newsom also issued Executive Order N-08-21, which set expiration dates for certain paragraphs of the State of Emergency Proclamation dated March 4, 2020 and other Executive Orders but did not rescind the proclaimed state of emergency; and,

WHEREAS, as of the date of this Resolution, neither the Governor nor the state Legislature have exercised their respective powers pursuant to Government Code section 8629 to lift the state of emergency either by proclamation or by concurrent resolution the state Legislature; and,

WHEREAS, the California Department of Industrial Relations has issued regulations related to COVID-19 Prevention for employees and places of employment. Title 8 of the California Code of Regulations, Section 3205(5)(D) specifically recommends physical (social) distancing as one of the measures to decrease the spread of COVID-19 based on the fact that particles containing the virus can travel more than six feet, especially indoors; and,

WHEREAS, the Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council Subcommittee finds that state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, based on the California Department of Industrial Relations' issuance of regulations related to COVID-19 Prevention through Title 8 of the California Code of Regulations, Section 3205(5)(D); and,

WHEREAS, as a consequence, the Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council Subcommittee does hereby find that it and its legislative bodies shall conduct their meetings by teleconferencing without compliance with Government Code section 54953 (b)(3), pursuant to Section 54953(e), and that such legislative bodies shall comply with the requirements to provide the public with access to the meetings as prescribed by Government Code section 54953(e)(2).

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, FOUND AND ORDERED by the Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council Subcommittee in regular session assembled on September 13, 2022 does hereby resolve as follows:

4 Section 1. Recitals. All of the above recitals are true and correct and are incorporated into this Resolution by this reference.

State or Local Officials Have Imposed or Recommended Measures to Promote Social Section 2. Distancing. The Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council Subcommittee hereby proclaims that state officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social (physical) distancing based on the California Department of Industrial Relations' issuance of regulations related to COVID-19 Prevention through Title 8 of the California Code of Regulations, Section 3205(5)(D).

Remote Teleconference Meetings. The Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council Section 3. Subcommittee and any of its legislative bodies are hereby authorized and directed to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of this Resolution including, conducting open and public meetings in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e) and other applicable provisions of the Brown Act.

Section 4. Effective Date. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and shall be effective until the earlier of (i) October 12, 2022, or (ii) such time the Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council adopts a subsequent resolution in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e)(3) to extend the time during which its legislative bodies may continue to teleconference without compliance with Section 54953(b)(3).

## Legislative Framework

- **<u>SB823</u>** required elements of program:
  - Mental health, sex offender treatment, or related behavioral or trauma-based needs.
  - Support programs or services that promote healthy adolescent development.
  - Family engagement in programs.
  - Reentry, including planning and linkage to employment, housing, and continuing education.
  - Whether and how the plan will include services or programs for realigned youth that are provided by nongovernmental or community-based providers.
- **<u>875 WIC</u>** provides legislative requirements to ensure eligibility, treatment and suitability have been reviewed.
- <u>SB92/AB200</u> provides legislative requirements once a youth has been committed (IRP, 6-month reduction of baseline confinement time, and programming services)








## Main Elements of Subcommittee Coordination

- According to 1995 WIC, a JJCC subcommittee of the Council shall be established and comprised of the <u>Chief Probation Officer as the chair</u>, <u>one representative</u> from the district attorney, public defender, social services, mental health, county office of education or school district, and a representative from the Court.
- The subcommittee shall also <u>include no fewer than three community members</u> (someone who has experience providing juvenile programs, youth advocates, or someone directly involved in the justice system).
- All community members will remain on the subcommittee <u>for three years</u> to convene as a group within their term.
- Attendance of members shall be taken and recorded in the minutes at all commission meetings. Any community member who <u>accumulates three unexcused</u> <u>absences from meetings</u> during the fiscal year shall be considered as having resigned from the commission. Excused absences are within the discretionary authority of the commission executive committee.
- Together, the subcommittee <u>will develop a plan</u> describing the facilities, programs, placements, services, and reentry strategies that are needed to provide appropriate rehabilitation and supervision services for the population



## Expectations

- The subcommittee will be broken into small teams to work on specific tasks by identifying their area of expertise, experience, and skills.
- > A leader will be identified for each team.
- > A member can be assigned to more than one team.
- The lead point of contact for each team will be assigned to set expectations for their respective team, gather information, and periodically meet with their respective team until the task is accomplished.
- The lead will meet monthly with the subcommittee facilitators (Monica Rose and Kathy Arias) for updates and guidance.
- Remain focused on the shared and desired outcome
- Stay within the budget and legislative framework
- Enhance current programming by utilizing community-based organizations and resources


